n elegant timber frame main residence, separated guesthouse and an outdoor gazebo are all laid into the hillside with multiple angles, levels, turrets and open spaces. "The design was a challenge due to the site conditions, the slope of the lot and the exposure being to the north," says Eric Hedlund, architect. "We designed a residence that was long and narrow, allowing every room to have a view of the lake."

"It was going to be a small house, and it grew," Ed says. "The quality of the project increased as we went."

The architect used computer graphics to allow the owners to preview all finish materials, from roofing, siding, paints, stone windows, and the copper accents that were at first questioned, but turned out to be one of the home's most striking features.






